Established in February 2012, the Singapore-United States Third Country Training Program (TCTP) is a partnership between the Singapore Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the U.S. Department of State to jointly conduct capacity building courses for Southeast Asian countries, in particular those in the Lower Mekong region. The TCTP supports ASEAN community-building efforts by addressing a range of economic, political, and social capacity building needs. Singapore and the United States draw on complementary expertise and experience to develop innovative capacity building programs that meet the priority needs of Southeast Asian countries.

Building Capacity through Connections

Each five-day TCTP workshop is co-facilitated by teams of subject matter expert trainers from Singapore and the United States, with courses adhering to three broad areas of training: (1) Connectivity; (2) Sustainable Development; and (3) Regional Resilience. Participants comprise relevant government officials from Burma, Brunei, Cambodia, Thailand, Malaysia, Vietnam, Indonesia, the Philippines, Laos, and, as of 2017, Timor-Leste. Beyond developing greater expertise on the topic, participants work together on exercises, presentations, and attend site visits. Through the program, participants reinforce personal connections with their counterparts from other Southeast Asian nations, building professional networks across national boundaries.

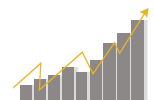
